### **Team Spotlight**

Rosy is InCommon's Programme Manager. Here, she shares some things she's learnt from talking to InCommon participants of all ages.

What's the most interesting thing you've learnt from an older person at InCommon?

I was fascinated when a resident reminisced about the lamplighters of the 1940s. She described how every evening when she was a child, she would see the local lamplighter cycle down the street with a wooden ladder on his back. He stopped at each street lamp, climbed his ladder, and lit the gas inside. That way, people could see their way around after dark. It's amazing to hear about these jobs that don't really exist anymore.

And what about the children - have you learnt anything new from them? I'm so impressed by how passionate the children are about the environment. They're all really clued up about global warming and brimming with ideas about how to stop it. The future is in good hands!

What's your favourite activity that you facilitate as part of InCommon's workshops?

I love 'A Day in the Life' – it's an activity where we compare a day in the children's lives today with a day in the older people's lives when they were 8 years old. A lot has changed! The older people tell us about blackboards, inkwells, and, sadly for many, harsh punishments from teachers. The children describe what classrooms look like now, complete with smartboards and recycling bins. But one thing that's stayed the same throughout the years seems to be timeless playground games!

## What would you say to someone who's thinking about getting involved with InCommon?

I'd really encourage them to get in touch! There are lots of different ways to take part, and, in my experience, it's always a real joy to come together with people from different generations.



## Looking ahead

We've been offering intergenerational phone and video calls to children and older people while Covid rates have remained high. But we're hoping to get back to some in-person workshops in the spring, bringing generations together in the great outdoors as the days get warmer! We're thinking about doing some gardening projects, as part of which the children will get digging, planting and growing with older people in their communities.
